
Welcome to the last school newsletter of March and the end of another busy week back in school. We're all looking forward to the weekend and have our fingers crossed for some sunny weather too...

This week saw the last leg of our epic run around Great Britain and Northern Ireland. We've run over 6300Km, but hey, who's counting?

TEAM WOODBOROUGH RUNS THE UK



We left **Canterbury** Cathedral on a bright spring morning, heading straight down alongside the A2 and soon reached Dover Castle. One of the largest castles in England, it proudly stands on top of the White Cliffs, overlooking the busy ferry port of **Dover**. The castle guards the shortest crossing point to continental Europe. (It is only 34 km (21 miles) between Dover and France.)



We headed east along the coast, towards a place best known for a date. Even though it took place al-

most 1,000 years ago, it changed the future of England forever. In 1066, 15,000 soldiers, in 700 ships, sailed across the English Channel. Under the command of William the Conqueror, they fought King Harold and his Army of 5,000 men, who were mostly farmers. The battle took place in October, about 6 miles northwest of **Hastings**. The English lost and King Harold was killed. On Christmas Day 1066, William of Normandy was crowned King of England.





After all this history, we decided to have some fun at the beach. **Brighton** is sometimes also referred to as 'London by Sea' and first became fashionable amongst day-trippers and holidaymakers from London in the late 1700s. The shingle beach might not lend itself to sandcastles but it's great for wandering along.

Further along the beach was the new I360 observation pod. The 162m high tower is the country's highest observation tower outside London and looked just like a doughnut. On a clear day you can see our next desitination, the Isle of Wight.



We had to take a ferry from **Portsmouth**, 6km across the Solent to the island that has been a holiday destination since Victorian times. Some come for Cowes Week, a famous sailing regatta, with up a thousand boats and 8,000 competitors.

Heading north, we passed the towering spires of **Salisbury** Cathedral - at 123m, they were the tallest we had seen in our epic run around the UK.

We then saw Stonehenge and marvelled at all the historic places we had seen on the 6300ish km route. We all had our favourite things we had seen during the run, for some it was the Jurassic Coast, the Angel of the North or the Giant's Causeway; what was yours?



With Great Britain and Northern Ireland's exciting history, it's no surprise that the country is full of amazing attractions. Whether you're looking to visit historic houses, stunning nature or incredible coastline, there are plenty of landmarks to enjoy when you're in the United Kingdom. At last we saw the school gates of Woodborough Cofe Primary School, we were safely back home!
